

City license now required to post properties on Airbnb, Vrbo, and other short-term rental sites

COMMERCE CITY HAS INTRODUCED a new Short-Term Rental (STR) License Program to regulate and manage short-term rental properties within city limits. The program aims to balance the benefits of short-term rentals for property owners and visitors to our community while maintaining the character of residential neighborhoods and addressing quality of life concerns. The new regulations were formally passed by City Council last year and went into effect on Jan. 1 of this year.

Property owners must now obtain a license before offering their homes as short-term rentals, and also must meet certain requirements. The license fee is \$150 for one year and must be renewed annually. Applications can be submitted online through the city's eTRAKit permitting portal at c3gov.com/eTRAKiT.

Highlights of the STR regulations include:

- STRs are permitted only in single-family detached homes or duplexes located in appropriately zoned areas (including R-1, R-2, R-3, AG, or Planned Unit Development).
- A long-term resident must occupy the property for the majority of the year, and the home cannot be left vacant or used exclusively as an STR.
- No more than one licensed STR is allowed within 500 feet of another STR in residential zones.
- The regulations also address the number of STR occupants, length of stay, and parking limitations.



For property owners aiming to use their property as an STR, please remember that HOA rules or covenants may be stricter than the city's regulations. Pioneer Park renovations making significant progress

THE CITY IS TAKING ADVANTAGE of the winter offseason to implement plans for renovations and improvements that will make Pioneer Park even more vibrant and engaging as a community asset. Located along E. 60th Avenue in the heart of Commerce City, Pioneer Park is a 37-acre facility that serves as a hub for various activities and gatherings for community members.



The Pioneer Park splash pad is undergoing a remarkable transformation made possible by a \$750,000 Adams County Open Space grant. The project addresses existing infrastructure issues and makes the splash pad ADA accessible through a redesign of the 2,500-square-foot space, which will continue to be a safe and sustainable family destination. The new and improved splash pad is set to open by Memorial Day weekend, just in time for summer adventures.

Paradise Island Pool at Pioneer Park is also receiving a much-needed overhaul, thanks to a \$1 million Adams County Open Space grant and funding from the city's Capital Investment Program. The project includes replacing all the underground pool piping to address leaks and water loss, along with the installation of new tiles and plastering across all pools. The project is expected to be completed by May in time for the summer season.

Finally, new scoreboards have been installed on all four of the Pioneer Park ballfields, making for a much-improved experience for our baseball and softball leagues for next season. Learn more about each project at c3gov.com/PioneerPark.

New Advancing Commerce City Together (ACT) program offerings getting underway

COMMERCE CITY RECENTLY ANNOUNCED the new ACT (Advancing Commerce City Together) program, funded by a \$7.5 million investment of federal grant dollars from the American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA). Through the end of 2026, the ACT Program aims to enhance the community’s well-being, infrastructure, and livability. The program encompasses seven key areas: Housing and livability, environment, food equity, infrastructure improvements, workforce development, Community Well-Being, and emergency rental and mortgage assistance.

In the coming months, residents will be able to apply to use ACT programs for assistance in areas such as:

- Minor home repairs
- Emergency rental and mortgage assistance
- Assistance to meet compliance for property code violations
- Staff assistance to find a path toward employment at a good wage

 You may also see the impact of ACT projects out in the community:

- Developing plans to improve sidewalks and make pedestrian safety upgrades
- \$200,000 granted to both Volunteers of America and Food Bank of the Rockies to provide culturally sensitive meals and a free weekly lunch at the Eagle Pointe Recreation Center
- Services provided by the city’s Community Well-Being Division

 Planning continues on many of these projects, with additional updates and project details coming soon as programs come online. The housing and livability program area should be accepting applications to serve you in the next few weeks.

Free Quarterly Bulk Pickup

Items that cannot fit inside your trash cart can be collected once per quarter at no extra charge. To know if your item meets the size and weight requirements or to schedule, call Republic Services at 303-286-1200 (Monday through Friday, 7 a.m. to 5 p.m.) This pickup must be scheduled with Republic Services. You can schedule additional bulk item pickups at any time for only \$16.72 per item.

Neighborhood Curbside Cleanup Days

Additionally, residents can participate in their Neighborhood Curbside Clean-Up Day. Each year, residential neighborhoods are divided into five areas for these events, with a different part of the city being serviced over five different Saturdays.

- **March 15:** All residents south of E. 88th Avenue and West of Highway
- **March 29:** All residents south of E. 88th Avenue and East of Highway 2
- **June 7:** All residents on Brighton Road and Highway 85 between 104th and 116th avenues; 104th to 120th avenues between highways 85 and 76; 112th to 120th avenues above Buffalo Run Golf Course; 122nd to 125th avenues east of Highway 76
- **July 12:** All residents east of Highway 2 from 96th Avenue to 104th Avenue; 96th Avenue to 103rd Avenue from Chambers Road to Highline Canal
- **Aug. 2:** All residents east of Chambers Road to Tower Road between 104th Avenue and 112th Avenue; Highline Canal to Tower Road from 88th to 104th avenues, east of Tower Road between 96th and 104th avenues

Despite facing challenges like noise issues around Denver International Airport and various socio-economic hurdles, our city remains steadfast in its commitment to finding solutions for all residents.

One of the most pressing issues in Commerce City is supporting our unhoused community members—individuals who have lost their homes due to financial struggles, health problems, or other unforeseen circumstances. In these moments, the commitment of our employees is truly commendable.

I recently had the honor and opportunity to visit several employees, during The Well, an event that happens the second Friday of every month. One person in particular is Pastor Jerimie, who exemplifies the spirit of service, often sacrificing personal time to care for others. Events like this, which are hosted in partnership with 180 Community Church at Templo Gethsemani, offer crucial services, such as medical assistance and hot meals, to those in need. Commerce City’s own Community Well-Being Division, located on the 5th floor of the South Platte Crossing building at 72nd and Colorado Blvd across from the 72nd light rail station, also provides essential services to our community, including our unhoused community members.

Commerce City has established partnerships with various organizations to ensure comprehensive support for those requiring help. Our employees’ dedication is evident in their efforts to maintain parks, prevent homeless encampments, and keep streets clean from waste, including discarded furniture, tires, and RVs.

While some may focus on the city’s shortcomings, it’s vital to recognize the ongoing, behind-the-scenes work that keeps Commerce City functioning smoothly. Our employees address immediate concerns and work diligently to improve the quality of life for all residents, including the unhoused.

In addition to maintaining daily operations, Commerce City collaborates with our two school districts to ensure that children from families who have lost their homes continue to receive an education. This partnership provides stability and opportunities for these young individuals to thrive, even in challenging circumstances.

Pastor Jerimie Olvera of 180 Church and Pastor Mark Hardacre of Landing Place Church also play crucial roles in supporting those in need. Pastor Mark focuses on the northern areas, while Pastor Jerimie dedicates his efforts to the southern regions. Together, they offer essential services to the unhoused and others facing hardships.

Commerce City is dedicated to addressing significant issues and ensuring that all residents, especially those in the most challenging situations, receive the support they need. Through the collective efforts of our City Council, our employees, community leaders, and non-profit partners, we continue to foster a sense of well-being and inclusivity, ensuring that everyone has access to the necessary resources to thrive, which hints at the title “Community Well-Being.”

We extend our heartfelt thanks to all our employees and partners for their unwavering dedication and hard work. Your efforts make a lasting impact on the lives of Commerce City residents and reflect the true spirit of our community.

Commerce City’s Community Well-Being team makes a lasting impact

SINCE ITS CREATION IN 2023, the city’s Community Well-Being Division (CWB) has been working to provide services and resources to community members in new and impactful ways. CWB staff are making meaningful strides in addressing homelessness and helping residents rebuild their lives. Through partnerships with organizations like Adams County’s Pathways to Stability program, the team connects individuals and families to vital resources that lead to stability and hope.

Since June 2024, the city has referred 13 households to Pathways to Stability, a program that provides immediate assistance and a pathway to permanent housing. One notable success story involved a mother, Ari, and her daughter, who had been experiencing homelessness for a year. With help from the program, they received temporary shelter, resettlement funds, and essentials to start fresh in a new city.

At the heart of these efforts is Community Navigator Jerimie Olvera, whose compassionate work has been instrumental in transforming lives. His ability to connect people with the support they need has earned admiration from those he serves and community partners.

“Jerimie has completely changed the trajectory of many lives in Commerce City,” said Adams County Poverty Reduction Services Coordinator Heather R. McClure. “His success rate is remarkable, and his ability to build trust and use resources effectively is truly inspiring.”

Jerimie’s partnership with programs like Hope Center Ministries has been particularly impactful in addressing addiction, which is often a key barrier to stability. His dedication ensures that residents have the tools to succeed, not just in the short term, but for the long haul.
